We Are Learning to:

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 Identify strategies for balancing time online/offline. 	 Understanding privacy and personal boundaries.
 Identify reasons for following age regulations and restrictions. 	Recognise on-line risks.
 Identify how to predict, assess and manage risk in different situations. 	 Recognise acceptable/ unacceptable physical contact.
 Understand what we can do reduce risks and keep safe. 	 Understand about seeking and giving permission
 Identify strategies for keeping safe in the local environment. 	Recognise pressure from others.
Identify strategies for keeping safe online.	 Recognise ways in which the internet and social media can be used both positively/negatively.
 Demonstrate basic techniques for dealing with common injuries. 	This also links to our topic 'My Online Life' which is taught in our computing sessions.

Useful conversations to have at home:

- Discuss risks with playing outside e.g. railway lines, pylons, road safety.
- Discuss the importance of limiting screen time and ways in which you can support your child in this e.g. setting timers.
- Discuss what to do if someone your child does not know tries to contact them online or they see something inappropriate online.
- You may want to watch the 'Play, Like, Share' videos 1- 3 (search YouTube) with your child.
 - You may want to watch the Millie Inbetween videos (search YouTube) with your child:
- -Bad Habits
 - -Nasty Comments
 - -Be Smart

We use these in our lessons and they provide a stimulus for discussion. Your child should be able to tell you what they have learnt in school.

- Discuss the word 'consent' and what it means in terms of allowing someone to do something e.g. borrow a toy
